
(c) Chord progressions

Good harmony isn't just a matter of putting a string of chords together. The word "progression" means that there is a sense of going from somewhere to somewhere else. A chord progression has a certain sense to it in the same way as a grammatically correct sentence does in language.


The examples below show you some of the most useful types of chord-linking that go into a progression. They can be identified by the way the ROOT of the chord changes from chord to chord. To keep matters simple, in all of these examples, the root is in the Bass voice (in other words, the chords are in ROOT POSITION).

SING and PLAY these examples. Try to MEMORISE them.


Try TRANSPOSING them into different keys.
